

Dear Einstein Community:

As our city and nation emerge from the COVID-19 pandemic, it's hard to miss the parallels to another catastrophe that sparked a public health crisis in our city almost 20 years ago: the events of 9/11—which is the subject of our cover story in the latest issue of <u>Einstein magazine</u> that was published this week.

That event—like the current pandemic—truly changed the course of history. And it is a testament to Einstein and Montefiore that our institutions played a critical role in addressing the persistent health consequences shouldered by the first responders who were at the World Trade Center site that day and worked "the pile" in the weeks and months that followed.

Our <u>9/11 cover story</u> looks back to the morning of the attacks and how it impacted the health of first responders over the past two decades. Dr. David Prezant, a member of our faculty and the chief medical officer for the New York City Fire Department, leads the ongoing research program for 9/11 first responders. Working with a range of Einstein-Montefiore colleagues, he has earned the trust of his patients, assiduously tracking and detailing how their heroic acts at the Twin Tower site has affected their health, and tirelessly advocated for federal support for their healthcare.

Most important—as is the case with the current pandemic—it is a story of hope, that has emerged from despair, and how science can make a major, positive contribution when the world seems to be falling apart. I encourage you to learn more about Dr. Prezant, his ongoing research program, and <u>profiles of three first responders</u>.
