I am about to celebrate my third anniversary as Einstein's dean and I am constantly reminded of how special our community is and why the College of Medicine is such a wonderful place to teach, learn, and do amazing research.

Good News and Accolades

It has been my pleasure to occasionally offer news of honors and recognition earned by members of our Einstein community. Following are some of the latest examples:

- With the Olympics beginning later in July, it seems fitting to note that Joanne Siegel, co-director of our Kennedy Center's University Center for Excellence in Developmental, Service, Training and Research, was invited to join Drs. Tim Shriver and Alicia Bazzano at the Special Olympics Inclusive Health Summit earlier this month. Her team's work to carry out the National Curriculum Initiative in Developmental Medicine project was recognized during the event, where she received a certificate of recognition and gave a presentation about our work on the curriculum initiative. Her invitation to the event noted, "The commitment that Albert Einstein College of Medicine has made to changing medical school curriculum is enormously powerful as an example to other schools."
- Earlier this week, our <u>BETTR program</u>, which is one of 21 Institutional Research and Academic Career Development Awards (IRACDA) programs for research and education nationwide, served as co-host with Rutgers and Stonybrook of the annual national conference. More than 400 people

tuned into this virtual event, including 170 IRACDA scholars. Presentations included a keynote by Dr. Marie Bernard, chief officer for scientific diversity at the NIH. Scholars in the program are committed to increasing the diversity of academic science.

- In recent weeks, Dr. Edward Chu, director of our <u>Albert Einstein Cancer Center</u>, shared some exciting new appointments for leadership within the center, including <u>Dr. Julio Aguirre-Ghiso</u>, who will lead our new Cancer Dormancy and Microenvironment Institute, and <u>Lauren Hackett</u>, who will supervise operations of our NCI-designated cancer center.
- <u>Dr. Matthew Akiyama</u> received one of only two \$2.5 million HIV/AIDS Research Avenir Awards from the National Institute on Drug Abuse. The honor is part of the new NIH Director's Pioneer Awards program, aimed at helping to curb HIV infection among individuals who inject drugs.
- Our department of ophthalmology and visual sciences held its
 27th annual Paul Henkind Day, which featured a research symposium and
 awards celebration. The event highlighted honors earned by Dr. Wei Liu,
 who won a grant from the National Eye Institute's 3-D Retina Organoid
 Challenge, and Dr. Jamie Rosenberg, who was named Medical Student
 Educator of the Year by the American Academy of Ophthalmology and the
 Association for Research in Vision and Ophthalmology. Dr. Rosenberg also
 was among faculty who received a teaching award at our 2021
 commencement.

I also want to remind everyone that human resources has organized monthly Appreciation Days—to celebrate all of you—and our next one, on **Friday, July 9**, will be the most celebratory yet. On a more serious note, I can't stress enough the importance of getting vaccinated, which is more important than ever with the new Delta variant of the COVID virus spreading across our country.
